

The book retains its focus on the period from the Norman Conquest of 1066 to the end of Edward I's reign in 1307. The production and retention of a variety of written records was extended from royal and monastic agencies to much wider forms of everyday business. As charters, writs, and other documents became commonplace, so developed England's literate mentality.
