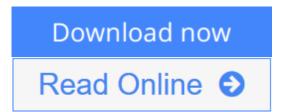


The China Tea Book

This elegant, pictorial introduction to the ways and "wise" of tea in China, by a Beijing-based tea-making master teaming with photographer Han Zheng, gracefully draws the English-speaking reader into the manufacture, presentation, and cultural surroundings of these fragrant leaves, in the process steeping us in information and appreciation. We learn about the four different tea varieties—green, oolong, black, and puerh—and their properties, best brewing methods, arts associated with tea culture (calligraphy, painting, and poetry), tea drinking's relationship to Zen, and even how tea was disseminated along the "Ancient Tea Route." Obviously, a rivalry with Japan exists: the author insists that China originated tea and Japan simply imitated the practice. But he realizes contemporary differences between the two, with Japan focused on the drink's spiritual expression and China on the actual drink. This book's pleasurable reading experience reflects the pleasure of tea drinking. --Barbara Jacobs
